

BaconFest donates \$10,000 to local Community Groups just in time for Christmas

Kingaroy community group, Kingaroy BaconFest has donated \$10,000 cash back into the South Burnett Community just in time for Christmas after a two-years of financial loss because of Covid impacts.

"We have an ongoing commitment to give back to our community. Kingarov BaconFest is about showcasing and advocating for our community, not only those involved in the pig industry, but our thriving agricultural industry as a whole." Said Chief Baconeer, Kristy Board.

Kingaroy BaconFest is a three-day festival run by a not-for-profit organisation that relies on sponsorship and ticket sales to pay for the regional destination event held in Glendon Street, Kingaroy. It generates \$1million dollars for the local economy and showcases the region on the national stage. In its grass roots approach, it's

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commitment to its own community is front-of-mind, working towards financial sustainability and the ability to give back cash to community groups in need, especially those that support the Agricultural industry.

Kristy said, "It is an incredible feeling, coming into Christmas, that we could deliver these cheques to The South Burnett Pantry, and South Burnett Suicide Prevention Group. The real spirit of our festival is shared in the moments with our community, and this was a very special moment. To hear the impact of \$5000 on these community groups, who support those struggling in our community has been extremely humbling"

South Burnett Suicide Prevention Group committee member Andrew Saal said, "Thank-You to Kingarov BaconFest. The South Burnett Suicide Prevention Group is about reducing stigma and sharing information about the suicide prevention services available to our region in times of need. This year the South Burnett Suicide Prevention Group held a number of events to spread awareness and share information on how we can support the community around us to prevent suicides. This money gives the Suicide Prevention Group the ability to start working on our events for next year and consider future initiatives for 2023."

The second \$5000 recipient was The South Burnett Pantry who are currently in desperate need of donations from the community to support the increased food need of local families due to cost of living and housing insecurity.

Jim Bennett from the South Burnett Pantry said, "With the money from Kingaroy BaconFest, it'll be the first time in months all costs have been able to be covered. Our organisation is completely run by volunteers, we have no room left to move, especially with the increased costs we are facing. This year, we are finding people are coming to the South Burnett Pantry with increased levels of desperation."

Annually, the Kingaroy BaconFest committee nominate a local charity group to donate surplus cash for local charitable causes.

A GRATEFUL NATION – DEFENCE FORCE CERTIFICATES OF APPRECIATION

Federal Member for Wide Bay Llew O'Brien is inviting defence force veterans who served overseas in Australia's Defence Forces from the Second World War on, and those who served on the home front during the Second World War, to apply for a Certificate of Appreciation from the Australian Government.

"The Saluting Their Service Commemorative Program is making the Certificates of Appreciation available as a way of expressing the nation's gratitude to those who served,"

Mr O'Brien said.

"Certificates of Appreciation will be issued to veterans who served overseas in wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations, or to those who provided logistics support in Vietnam, or served on the home front during World War II." The Certificates of Appreciation are designed primarily for living veterans to express the nation's gratitude for their service.

While family members can apply on behalf of eligible veterans who are deceased, certificates will not be issued on behalf of Boer War or First World War veterans.

National Servicemen who served overseas in eligible conflicts and operations, including Vietnam, and Reserve personnel who served in one of the Peacekeeping Operations theatres are eligible for a Certificate of Appreciation for that service.

"I encourage all eligible veterans to apply for their Certificate of Appreciation."



Kathy's Comments

Exciting News for PCYC

I am excited to let the community know that Council has approved the funding for the wheelchair toilets and shower upgrades at the PCYC. This funding will be provided through a Federal Government Grant called LRCI and is for Local Roads and Community Infrastructure. I would like to thank Rene from the PCYC for providing some important information about the current situation. The PCYC building has 3 sets of toilets that do not cater for disabled people, either for a toilet or a shower. There is one designated disabled toilet and shower, however it is not in the main fover near and is not to current standards for size and manoeuvrability. 109 disabled people attended the PCYC last year. This is a mix of those who require exercise with the guide of their doctors or carers and recently has been from the young disabled youth of this area who are in wheelchairs who participate in the wheelchair basketball sessions. The wheelchair basketball team has since competed away with commonwealth games associates and won medals. In the future the PCYC plans to host a wheelchair carnival. Last year there where over 1600 young people aged between 0 and 9 who attended the facility. There is no room currently designated for young families to change so the upgrade will also include a family change room.

Exciting News for Roads in our community

It was supported at the last Council Meeting that Council commit to undertaking the following rehabilitation and bitumen reseal projects including any identified unapproved REPA (flood funded projects) There will be rehabilitation projects on Campbells and Silverleaf Road. There will be bitumen reseals on roads including Borcherts Hill Rd, Elbow Road, Flats Road, Hetherington's Road, Kawl Kawl Road, Keleher St, Hivesville, Reif's Road, Tingoora Chelmsford Rd and Webbers Bridge Road. This work may not include the whole road but it will certainly be a major improvement to these roads. I have also had great feedback from local community members about some of the work that has been done on our gravel roads. The feedback I am getting is that the grading is better and that there has been a major improvement in the work that is being done particularly on the table and tail drains.

Murgon Show & Cabaret

It was wonderful to attend the Boot Scootin' Show Cabaret and have some good old -fashioned fun. Congratulations to the winners on the night including the Murgon Showgirl, Amy Henderson and the Rural Ambassador, Patrick Noakes. South Burnett Regional Council would like to advise the community that from Saturday 1 April 2023, cash will no longer be accepted at the Nanango, Wondai and Murgon Waste Facilities. This will bring these sites into alignment with the Kingaroy waste facility as this facility only accepts EFTPOS or via an account.

Council recommends that commercial businesses set up a Monthly Waste Account for easy operations. This can be done by visiting one of Council's Customer Contact Offices, completing the form online at https://www.southburnett.qld.gov.au/homepage/280/forms or using Council's Recyclopedia App.

Most domestic waste is free of charge, however, there are a few domestic waste types that have a fee for disposal. If domestic residents are required to pay at the facilities, Council recommends to residents to pay by eftpos.

Local Built Small Grants Program Extension of Time

Council has extended the dates for Round 2 of the Local Built Small Grants Program. Applications are now open and close on Monday, 20 March 2023 to allow more time for community organisations and sporting groups to apply for funding. Outcomes of Round 2 will be advised by Thursday, 6 April 2023.

Projects will need to be completed between the 7 April 2023 and 31 December 2023, and acquittals lodged by applicants within 4 weeks of the projects being completed and no later than 31 January 2024.

As part of the South Burnett Regional Council's delivery of the Australian Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program, the Local Built Small Grants – Social Recovery Investment Stream has been developed to support community groups to create and deliver projects that build resilience and economic recovery in the South Burnett region.

A total pool of \$100,000 was available across two rounds with grants up to \$3,000 and \$5,000 possible depending on the category. There are three categories: small events, community building and facilities planning.

Key objectives of the funding are to support projects that promote the wellbeing, resilience, adaptation to climate change, and build skills in, and knowledge of the environment. Organisations must be based within the South Burnett or show substantial benefit to the residents of the South Burnett.

Grape harvest underway in South Burnett

South Burnett wineries and vineyard operators are all systems go for the 2023 Vintage.

Vineyards have enjoyed near perfect ripening conditions for the 2022/23 growing season and the first of the wine grapes have been harvested at several vineyards across the region.

South Burnett Wine Industry Association (SBWIA) President, Simon Berry said this season has been a little later than previous years with cooler than average December temperatures contributing to the delay.

"But fruit quality and crop loads are extremely good and if we can get through harvest without too many rain events, it looks like being a great result for the region," Mr Berry said.

Most of the white grape varieties should be picked within the next two weeks and the red varieties will continue through February-March before harvest is completed.

Mr Berry was re-elected as SBWIA President at the association's recent AGM.

In his President's report, Mr Berry reflected on the group's many achievements, noting the high level of camaraderie among members, culminating with the regional promotion at the 2022 Gympie Music Muster. The South Burnett Wine Time venue hosted thousands of happy event patrons.

"It has been another great year for our wineries with good, sustained levels of visitation in the post-Covid world and with a pleasing number of awards for our wineries and wines on a state and national stage. I congratulate every winery in the region for their personal successes and awards, they are all much deserved."

He said other major achievements during the year included:

- Re-branding the SBWIA logo and new website
 - Publication and distribution of the new A3 wine trail map
 - Featuring on the Australian Wine Show with Jill Upton and other media coverage received through Q Wines, Salt Magazine as well as local and regional press.

Mr Berry said he looked forward to building on these solid foundations in 2023, particularly highlighting the importance of supplying local wine at local events, seeking out new opportunities and avenues to promote the region and improve awareness. He said the association was also investigating staging more food, wine and music events and looked forward to announcing details as plans come together.

"I look forward to the next 12 months as we continue to grow and encourage greater visitation to the South Burnett Wine Region. People really enjoy what we have going here. 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Recycle Right - Keep Out Soft Plastics and other Contaminants

South Burnett Regional Council thanks the community for their support with the rollout of the new recycling bins. However, there is some confusion regarding which plastics can be recycled.

Council is urging residents to keep soft plastics out of their recycling bins in order to protect the environment and keep the Cherbourg Material Recovery Facility working effectively and efficiently. Only hard plastics can be recycled.

Any plastic that can be scrunched is called soft plastic and should not be placed in the yellow lid recycling bin. It must be placed in the general waste bin. Bottles / cans or any other recycling materials should be placed loose in the recycling bin (not in a plastic bag of any kind). The second biggest contamination has been garden waste (mainly lawn clippings). While this can be composted at home / any other commercial composting facility, it cannot be recycled through the yellow lid recycling bin.

Round 8 of the Stronger Communities Programme.

I am pleased to share some positive news for 2023 with the opening of Round 8 of the Stronger Communities Programme.

The Stronger Communities Programme provides each of the 151 Federal electorates with \$150,000 to fund small capital projects. These projects aim to improve local community participation and contribute to vibrant, viable communities.

Round 8 is focussed on supporting communities to recover from the widespread impacts of adverse weather events and current economic pressures.

Grants between \$2,500 and \$20,000 are available. The maximum cost of a project cannot exceed \$50,000.

For this round, grant funding will be up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs, except for local governing bodies where grant funding will be up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs. Local governing bodies must provide matched funding contributions towards their eligible project.

Projects are required to be completed by 31 December 2023.

The following entities are eligible to apply:

- · local government bodies
- incorporated not-for-profit organisations
- incorporated trustees on behalf of a trust with responsibility for a community asset or property.
- a Commonwealth, state or territory government agency or entity that is a fire service, rural fire service, country fire authority, state emergency service or similar.

Please take the time to familiarise yourself with the attached Factsheet and Grant Opportunity Guidelines to determine if your project is eligible to apply.

Mayor cautions landowners on dealing with some Renewable Energy Companies



Mayor of the South Burnett, Brett Otto is urging local farmers and landowners to be vigilant when entering into discussions with proponents of renewable energy developments, including wind farms, solar energy sites and transmission lines.

The South Burnett region will play a major role in the Queensland Government's Energy and Jobs Plan and is

expecting an influx of renewable energy infrastructure developers.

Our region can expect to see more companies moving into the area and start approaching our local farmers and private landholders to acquire or lease their land.

"We certainly acknowledge the short-term construction phase benefits of renewables however this must not come at the long-term expense of our local communities," the Mayor said.

Mayor Otto is highlighting the importance of landowners understanding their rights and not entering into contracts or land access agreements without adequate legal advice.

Mayor Otto has warned of potential issues to farmers who jump into agreements. Acting without expert advice could see farmers facing bio-security issues, environmental impacts and possible restrictions to their farming activities.

"If these developers are serious, then they should be dipping into their corporate pockets to reimburse land holders for any specialist consulting or legal advice sought as part of their negotiations," the Mayor said.

Mayor Otto has also pointed out the inadequacy of state regulations governing the activities of renewable energy companies. "Government regulation does little to hold these companies to account and protect the rights of private land holders and their neighbours," the Mayor said.

Mayor Otto is working closely with other regional Mayors in engaging with government to address these issues.

"There is massive implications for generations to come and I won't be sitting back and allowing our residents to be taken advantage of or see the South Burnett left behind," Mayor Otto said.

State Government house in Nanango remains empty during housing crisis

Member for Nanango, Deb Frecklington says it is unacceptable that a State Government owned house in Nanango has remained empty during the current housing crisis.

Mrs Frecklington said the home, formerly occupied by respected Nanango doctor, Dr John Robinson, has remained empty since he left the residence in June 2020.

"For two and a half years, this large, four bedroom home, has sat empty while families from our region desperately search to put a roof over their heads," Deb said.

"I recently asked a Question on Notice* of the Minister for the Department of Public Works, Mick De Brenni about why the property has remained vacant given the current high demand for housing.

"The Minister claims there has been no demand for government employee housing in Nanango, and they are still deciding what to do with the home.

"It seems incredible that it has taken nearly three years to make a decision about a home like this. It should have been made available sooner.

"It also begs the question about how many other State Government owned homes there are like this that are left empty while vulnerable people can't find accommodation.

"I am calling on the State Government to make a decision about the house as soon as possible so it becomes available for either social housing or the rental market," Deb said.

Warren Brown: Why taking a road trip in a Tesla revealed the limitations of electric vehicles

I knew electric vehicles had questionable range, but in our quest for a green utopia I had no idea of the seat-of-the-pants hell of driving one in far-flung NSW, writes an EV-fatigued Warren Brown.

If you ask anyone who knows me there's nothing I like more than a jolly good road trip.

If you hang around long enough I'm guaranteed to bore anyone within earshot with tales of my road-going adventures that are so bonkers I have trouble believing them myself.

It's all about the joy of long-distance motoring – the freedom it gives, the chance for adventure.

So when the opportunity to jump aboard an electric car and head west for the Riverina turned up last week I just couldn't say no – after all, Energy Minister Chris Bowen has made it painfully clear the future for personal transport in Australia is electric.

Photographer Jonathan Ng and I were to head to Griffith last week for the annual Daily Telegraph Bush Summit. Instead of catching a flight from Sydney we decided to drive.

Jonathan, a car guy like myself, offered to pick me up from Goulburn in his 2019 Tesla and drive us the 390km west.

While I've driven electric cars before, I'd never been in one for any considerable distance, and while I'd experienced an EV's blistering performance, like most people I was also aware of their shortcomings when it came to their range.

The Tesla struck me as the ideal car for a long drive, with its leather seats and plenty of leg room. The vehicle brimmed with futuristic features: instead of dashboard instruments there was what was fundamentally a giant iPad in front of the driver and passenger, which incorporates an endless variety of nifty features – satellite monitoring, Netflix, and most importantly a map indicating where recharging stations are situated.

"We'll pull up at Gundagai, plug the car in and grab some breakfast," Jonathan told me as we re-joined the highway, the thought of which sounded like a capital idea.

The 188km drive from Goulburn to Gundagai was effortless, and before long we'd arrived at the feet of the Dog on the Tuckerbox, to pull up at a bank of charging stations at which there is another Tesla and a Volvo-based Polestar already receiving an intravenous dose of 240 volts.

"We'll be here for half an hour or so" Jonathan told me as he plugged in our Tesla. And in the spirit of throwing healthy eating to the wind we partook in the first of what would be many roadside gourmand experiences for the day – two bacon and egg rolls and coffee.

In half an hour we returned to the car, where the other EV drivers were now unplugging their life support.

Despite being part of the rarefied 2 per cent of the population who are electric vehicle owners, it struck me how no one was making any well-met, collegiate chitchat about their cars. You know – "G'day mate! How many megahertz are you getting to the gallon?" kind of thing.

Instead, clearly wary of these electrical interlopers, Jonathan told me to keep an eye on where those guys were heading because it was imperative we got to a town before them – if there's only one charger in a town and they get there first then it's a half an hour waiting while they charge, then a half an hour for us.

I'm beginning to get it – for EV drivers out here on the open road it's now a lithium-battery Hunger Games – a charge to get charged before the other guy takes charge.

Stuffed with bacon and egg rolls, we headed off for Wagga Wagga, some 88km away, where our mission was to quickly find the resident charging station placed in a car park, and another 45-minute stay to recharge again.

A vanilla slice and three-quarters of an hour later and we were back on the road, heading for the only charging station in Narrandera – a lonely monument to a green Australia plonked in a side street where we hooked up for yet another electricity fix. A pie from the bakery this time and we ever-expanding local-pastry-filled Electric Road Warriors were on the last leg to Griffith, with one eye on the road and the other on the diminishing battery-level symbol on the screen, arriving in town to hook the car up for an electro-adrenaline hit yet again.

As someone who'd had no experience with EVs in the bush I was now taken hold by a new and genuine phenomenon that's recently arisen with the advent of electric cars. It's a paranoia known euphemistically as "range anxiety" – a rather patronising term suggesting that the fear of being stranded in the never-never without a spark of electricity and facing certain death is merely some sort of minor psychosis, like being afraid of the dark.

I knew electric vehicles had questionable range, but I had no idea of the seat-of-the-pants logistics of driving one in the Outback.

It was becoming glaringly obvious to me the federal government's rabid fervour to fast-track electric vehicles by cracking down and dispensing with the internal combustion engine seems more than alarming in that we're not being given the full picture of what the consequences will be.

I discovered there are two issues with electric vehicles that proponents tend to gloss over: the cars' batteries don't like cold weather, and nor do they like continuous high-speed driving – two rather important and regularly encountered features when driving in the Outback.

Not only do lithium batteries have reduced efficiency when it's cold, but if you put the car's heater on (so you don't freeze) you'll reduce its charge even quicker – therefore reducing the range.

MYEV.com suggests in order to keep the battery happy you should "park your car in a heated garage" – something else to load onto an already beleaguered electricity grid.

Unlike internal combustion engines, electric vehicles are happier in the "stop-start" situations you'd find in the city than the massive long-distance hauls you'd typically encounter in the Australian Outback.

If you do run out of charge, the car will give plenty of warning, resorting to "limp mode" for some time. But when it has eventually rolled to a complete stop, pray you have charge and range for your mobile phone, as it's a tilt tray to the nearest town.

Scandinavian countries such as Norway are perennially wheeled out as the poster children for EVs. Yet the widest part of Norway is roughly the distance from Sydney to Dubbo, whereas the widest part of Australia is equivalent to the distance from London to Moscow.

In a green utopia where we're all compelled to drive electric cars, who on Earth would be game enough to visit remote Outback towns in far-flung NSW?

This would conceivably curtail enthusiasm for regional tourism.

Three weeks ago I was at a roadside servo between Wilcannia and Cobar, the cafe alive with grey nomads and tourists exploring NSW post-Covid. But not an electric vehicle nor charging station in sight.

In our diesel Toyota Prado we needed to make a 250km detour due to flooding. How you could do that in an electric car out there I simply can't imagine.

As for us, our return journey was the long, anxious process of charger-hopping in reverse sequence – sitting in the dark at Gundagai at 12.30am while the car took on more volts tended to take the shine off our grand motoring adventure – and not a vanilla slice in sight.

SNAKES ALIVE!



"Over recent weeks we have had graphic reminders – of the wriggly kind – to: "Watch out! Snakes are about!" First, a young red-bellied black snake took up residence in the control box of our waste-water system. Although it was moved on several times, it continued to return – until, we think, it grew too big to slide through a tiny gap! Just before Christmas, we had two small brown snakes – on consecutive days – in different rooms of the house! Neither seemed unduly disturbed by our presence and both were reluctant to leave. After we had ushered them outdoors with soft brooms, we were left wondering how long they had been sharing our house - and if we had further uninvited quests!

While most snake sightings are between October and March, **snake bites occur throughout the year. Everyone** should know the recommended **First Aid for snake bite** -

5 Step Pressure Immobilisation Technique.

REST:

keep casualty CALM & STILL



COVER:

cover bite site with clean pad bandage over and around bite site. (Use 10cm compression bandage)



BANDAGE: firmly

from fingers/toes, covering the whole limb. (Use 15cm compression bandages)



Emmi

SPLINT: immobilise the limb Use strong stick for leg.

Immobilise joints both sides of bite site.





Use sling for arm.



GET HELP

Call Triple Zero (ambulance) OR
Use free Emergency + app (has coordinates)
Keep casualty calm and still, under constant observation
until help arrives; keep limb immobilised.

Labor's Patient Tax hurting patients and local GP practices

I recently met with staff and Doctors from the Nanango Medical Centre to discuss the many issues affecting GP's and medical centres, especially the threat being imposed by the introduction of the State Labor Government's new Patient Tax.

The Treasurer's new tax was dropped on the eve of Christmas without any public consultation or modelling when the Queensland Revenue Office unveiled a new public ruling. It has re-interpreted the law so that general practice and other health practitioners will now be subject to payroll tax.

This will mean practices will have no choice but to increase the cost of seeing a GP, and could see the end of bulk-billing in Queensland.

Unfortunately the State Government refuses to acknowledge the serious ramifications this change will have for patients and GP practices. They refuse to acknowledge that GP's are already being forced to shut their doors, and charge patients more to see their doctor.

I am calling on the State Labor Government to put a stop to the new Patient Tax. At the very least, they must make an exemption for rural and regional practices, especially the very few that still provide bulk-billing services.

For rural and regional areas that are already feeling the effect of a lack of GP's, and the further pressure this places on our hospital system, this is tax that will have dire consequences for a health system already in crisis.

This is a wonderful piece by Michael Gartner, editor of newspapers large and small and president of NBC News. In 1997, he won the Pulitzer Prize for editorial writing. It is well worth reading, and a few good chuckles are guaranteed.

My father never drove a car. Well, that's not quite right. I should say I never saw him drive a car.

He quit driving in 1927, when he was 25 years old, and the last car he drove was a 1926 Whippet.

"In those days," he told me when he was in his 90s, "to drive a car you had to do things with your hands, and do things with your feet, and look every which way, and I decided you could walk through life and enjoy it or drive through life and miss it."

At which point my mother, a sometimes salty Irishwoman, chimed in:

"Oh, bull shit!" she said. "He hit a horse."

"Well," my father said, "there was that, too."

So my brother and I grew up in a household without a car. The neighbors all had cars -- the Kollingses next door had a green 1941 Dodge, the VanLaninghams across the street a gray 1936 Plymouth, the Hopsons two doors down a black 1941 Ford -- but we had none.

My father, a newspaperman in Des Moines, would take the streetcar to work and, often as not, walk the 3 miles home. If he took the streetcar home, my mother and brother and I would walk the three blocks to the streetcar stop, meet him and walk home together.

My brother, David, was born in 1935, and I was born in 1938, and sometimes, at dinner, we'd ask how come all the neighbors had cars but we had none. "No one in the family drives," my mother would explain, and that was that.

But, sometimes, my father would say, "But as soon as one of you boys turns 16, we'll get one." It was as if he wasn't sure which one of us would turn 16 first.

But, sure enough, my brother turned 16 before I did, so in 1951 my parents bought a used 1950 Chevrolet from a friend who ran the parts department at a Chevy dealership downtown.

It was a four-door, white model, stick shift, fender skirts, loaded with everything, and, since my parents didn't drive, it more or less became my brother's car.

Having a car but not being able to drive didn't bother my father, but it didn't make sense to my mother.

So in 1952, when she was 43 years old, she asked a friend to teach her to drive. She learned in a nearby cemetery, the place where I learned to drive the following year and where, a generation later, I took my two sons to practice driving. The cemetery probably was my father's idea. "Who can your mother hurt in the cemetery?" I remember him saying more than once.

For the next 45 years or so, until she was 90, my mother was the driver in the family. Neither she nor my father had any sense of direction, but he loaded up on maps -- though they seldom left the city limits -- and appointed himself navigator. It seemed to work.

Still, they both continued to walk a lot. My mother was a devout Catholic, and my father an equally devout agnostic, an arrangement that didn't seem to bother either of them through their 75 years of marriage.

(Yes, 75 years, and they were deeply in love the entire time.)

He retired when he was 70, and nearly every morning for the next 20 years or so, he would walk with her the mile to St. Augustin's Church.

She would walk down and sit in the front pew, and he would wait in the back until he saw which of the parish's two priests was on duty that morning. If it was the pastor, my father then would go out and take a 2-mile walk, meeting my mother at the end of the service and walking her home.

If it was the assistant pastor, he'd take just a 1-mile walk and then head back to the church. He called the priests "Father Fast" and "Father Slow."

After he retired, my father almost always accompanied my mother whenever she drove anywhere, even if he had no reason to go along. If she were going to the beauty parlor, he'd sit in the car and read, or go take a stroll or, if it was summer, have her keep the engine running so he could listen to the Cubs game on the radio. In the evening, then, when I'd stop by, he'd explain: "The Cubs lost again. The millionaire on second base made a bad throw to the millionaire on first base, so the multimillionaire on third base scored."

If she were going to the grocery store, he would go along to carry the bags out -- and to make sure she loaded up on ice cream. As I said, he was always the navigator, and once, when he was 95 and she was 88 and still driving, he said to me, "Do you want to know the secret of a long life?"

"I guess so," I said, knowing it probably would be something bizarre.

"No left turns," he said.

"What?" I asked.

"No left turns," he repeated. "Several years ago, your mother and I read an article that said most accidents that old people are in happen when they turn left in front of oncoming traffic.

As you get older, your eyesight worsens, and you can lose your depth perception, it said. So your mother and I decided never again to make a left turn."

"What?" I said again.

"No left turns," he said. "Think about it.. Three rights are the same as a left, and that's a lot safer. So we always make three rights."

"You're kidding!" I said, and I turned to my mother for support.

"No," she said, "your father is right. We make three rights. It works."

But then she added: "Except when your father loses count."

I was driving at the time, and I almost drove off the road as I started laughing.

"Loses count?" I asked.

"Yes," my father admitted, "that sometimes happens. But it's not a problem. You just make seven rights, and you're okay again."

I couldn't resist. "Do you ever go for 11?" I asked.

"No," he said " If we miss it at seven, we just come home and call it a bad day. Besides, nothing in life is so important it can't be put off another day or another week."

My mother was never in an accident, but one evening she handed me her car keys and said she had decided to quit driving. That was in 1999, when she was 90.

She lived four more years, until 2003. My father died the next year, at 102.

They both died in the bungalow they had moved into in 1937 and bought a few years later for \$3,000. (Sixty years later, my brother and I paid \$8,000 to have a shower put in the tiny bathroom -- the house had never had one. My father would have died then and there if he knew the shower cost nearly three times what he paid for the house.)

He continued to walk daily -- he had me get him a treadmill when he was 101 because he was afraid he'd fall on the icy sidewalks but wanted to keep exercising -- and he was of sound mind and sound body until the moment he died.

One September afternoon in 2004, he and my son went with me when I had to give a talk in a neighboring town, and it was clear to all three of us that he was wearing out, though we had the usual wide-ranging conversation about politics and newspapers and things in the news.

A few weeks earlier, he had told my son, "You know, Mike, the first hundred years are a lot easier than the second hundred." At one point in our drive that Saturday, he said, "You know, I'm probably not going to live much longer."

"You're probably right," I said.

"Why would you say that?" He countered, somewhat irritated.

"Because you're 102 years old," I said.

"Yes," he said, "you're right." He stayed in bed all the next day.

That night, I suggested to my son and daughter that we sit up with him through the night.

He appreciated it, he said, though at one point, apparently seeing us look gloomy, he said:

"I would like to make an announcement. No one in this room is dead yet"

An hour or so later, he spoke his last words:

"I want you to know," he said, clearly and lucidly, "that I am in no pain. I am very comfortable. And I have had as happy a life as anyone on this earth could ever have."

A short time later, he died.

I miss him a lot, and I think about him a lot. I've wondered now and then how it was that my family and I were so lucky that he lived so long.

I can't figure out if it was because he walked through life,

Or because he quit taking left turns. "

Life is too short to wake up with regrets.

So love the people who treat you right.

Forget about the one's who don't.

Believe everything happens for a reason.

If you get a chance, take it & if it changes your life, let it.

Nobody said life would be easy, they just promised it would most likely be worth it."

Systematic Inspection Program for Dog Registration

In accordance with section 114 of the Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008 (the Act) notice is hereby given that the South Burnett Regional Council intends to conduct an Approved Systematic Inspection Program to ensure that all dogs are registered in accordance with the Act.

The program will commence on Wednesday 1 March 2023 and concludes on Friday 30 June 2023.



The properties to be included in the Systematic Inspection Program are potentially all residential and rural residential properties within the South Burnett area.

Inspections will be conducted between 8.00am and 5.00pm Monday to Friday during this period.

All dogs over the age of 3 months are obliged to be registered with the local authority, in which the animal resides, as required by the state's Animal Management legislation. This systematic inspection program seeks to proactively check to see if animal owners are complying with their obligations.

Council is permitted to undertake these house inspections in order to ascertain compliance with the legislation. The Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008 provides the necessary head of power to carry out the registration checking activities. Fines may apply in circumstances of non-compliance (on the spot fine \$287.00).

Façade Improvement Grant - Extension of Time

Council has extended the dates for Round 2 of the Façade Improvement Program. Applications are now open and close on Monday, 20 March 2023 to allow more time for business and property owners to apply for funding. Outcomes of Round 2 will be advised by Thursday, 6 April 2023.

Projects will need to be completed between the 7 April 2023 and 31 December 2023, and acquittals lodged by applicants within 4 weeks of the works being completed and no later than 31 January 2024.

As part of the South Burnett Regional Council's delivery of the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants Program, the Local Built Small Grants – Economic Recovery Investment Stream has been developed to support community groups to create and deliver projects that build resilience and social recovery in the South Burnett region.

South Burnett Regional Council, in partnership with the region's Chamber of Commerce and Business Development organisations, is providing incentives to support small businesses within the central business districts (CBDs) of Blackbutt, Kingaroy, Murgon, Nanango, and Wondai to improve their business façades. Funding is provided through the Australian Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grant Program – Community Connection Local Built.

A total pool of \$300,000 was available across two rounds. A minimum grant amount is \$500 with a maximum grant of \$3,000 with a 50% co-contribution required (dollar for dollar funding).

Improvements to frontages may include lighting, exterior walls, windows and doors, storefronts, awnings/canopies, signage, exterior architectural features, exterior painting, reinstatement of historical features of the building and increased accessibility to shop fronts.
