Tourism growth in South Burnett outpaces Queensland

Double digit growth in visitor numbers and visitor spend is being celebrated by the region's industry operators this week as the spring festival season kicks off with perfect weather.

South Burnett's tourism industry took a leap forward according to the 2018 release of Tourism Research Australia (TRA) statistics. Domestic overnight visitors increased by 18.6% to 211,503 while domestic day visitors increased 17.4% to 472,286. While international visitation remained steady, increasing 5.8%, the total number of visitors increased by over 100,000 to 686,687.

Visitor spend followed a similar trend, outpacing Queensland's remarkable 16% increase. Visitor spend in the South Burnett increased by 19.4% to \$114,465,879.

"South Burnett is enjoying a resurgence in tourism," said South Burnett Regional Council Mayor, Keith Campbell.

"After changing tack in 2017, the figures released from TRA prove that growth is occurring across the tourism industry, with higher growth in visitors and spending than Queensland and Australia," he added

Mayor Campbell continued "South Burnett in Spring is a visitor's paradise, with lively events, beautiful weather and many opportunities to enjoy the outdoor attractions and experiences across the region."



Dob In a Dealer campaign will help clean up drugs in Wide Bay

Dob in a Dealer campaign run by Crime Stoppers Australia, benefitting communities across Wide Bay. The program is funded from the proceeds of crime, money that was destined to line the pockets of our most serious criminals.

“Dob in a Dealer is a call to action to Wide Bay communities to provide Crime Stoppers with information to assist law enforcement in disrupting the import, manufacture and supply of ice and other harmful illicit drugs,”

“We encourage Wide Bay residents to anonymously contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or online at www.crimestoppers.com.au to ‘dob in’ those people profiting from the use of illicit drugs in our community.

“Drugs such as ice have a devastating impact on local communities.

“The Government recognises that police can’t fight this on their own, and that our community can play a strong part to undermine and disrupt any criminal business models operating in local areas.” The last *Dob in a Dealer* campaign, which ran between February 2016 and March 2017, saw an average national increase of 95 per cent in drug-related information reports, including an increase of 143 per cent in the number of amphetamine-related reports from the public.

During 2016 in Queensland, Crime Stoppers received more than 17,000 drug-related information reports, including more than 5200 amphetamine-related reports. This led to more than 600 arrests and the seizure of more than \$1 million worth of drugs.

Managing invasive fish in Queensland

Management of invasive freshwater fish, molluscs and crustaceans is part of the portfolio of the Invasive Plants & Animals (IP&A) team at Biosecurity Queensland. The group is responsible for policy and regulatory changes (e.g. listing new noxious species), operational responses to introductions of invasive species into Australian waterways, developing and supporting invasive fish research, and engaging and educating the public on invasive fish issues.

Keeping carp (*Cyprinus carpio*) out of North Queensland is a top priority, as the species is currently only established in eight catchments across southern Queensland. Other priorities include reducing the rate of spread of Mozambique and spotted tilapia (*Oreochromis mossambicus* and *Tilapia mariae*) across the state, where we implore the fishing public to not move tilapia around or use them for bait – this activity can cause infestation of new waterways. Other high risk ornamental fish that have been deliberately released include pearl cichlids (*Geophagus brasiliensis*) in the Brisbane and Pine River Catchments, and jaguar cichlids (*Parachromis managuensis*) and peacock bass (*Cichla* spp.) in the Pioneer Catchment, Mackay. IP&A is continually working with aquarium hobbyists and industry to ensure the responsible ownership of pet fish across the state.

Biosecurity Queensland supports local fishing clubs, school groups and councils to run pest fishing days in their local area – these provide fantastic educational opportunities and community events. Contact the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries call centre for more information on 13 25 23.






The process for fabrication and installation of the signage will take a number of months to complete, with the installation expected to commence in December 2019 and completion in the first quarter of 2020.



Water Main Replacements - Kingaroy

As a part of Council's capital works program and its commitment to ensure the long term sustainability and efficiency of our water infrastructure, Council has engaged Roman Contractors to undertake the replacement of water mains in the following locations:

- Youngman Street (Haly Street to Avoca Street)
- Youngman Street (Venman Street to Banksia Drive)
- Toomey Street (Youngman Street to William Street)
- Burnett Street (Haly Street to Alford Street)
- Knight Street (Walter Road to Hodge Street)
- West Street (Haly Street to Kurtellan Crescent)

Works are currently underway for West Street with Burnett Street expected to begin the week beginning 9 September 2019.

Upon completion of these works, the water main replacements in Youngman Street and Toomey Street will occur in early October. In order to provide a safe work environment, parking in Youngman Street during the main replacement works will be restricted and lane closures are likely as the new infrastructure is installed. Access to properties will also be affected for short periods as installation occurs. Due to the complexity of the main replacements in both sections of Youngman Street, Council will be undertaking consultation with customers directly affected by the works, including property access, parking arrangements and interruptions to water supply. Contact will be made with customers individually in the week commencing 16 September 2019 to discuss and determine arrangements to minimise disruptions.

Earlier preparation works will be required in some areas to improve the systems valves and to minimise interruptions to supply. Affected properties will be notified directly prior to these works occurring.

Fish are Deep but Hungry

Spring is officially here and it's the time of year that I always look forward to. The water temps are gradually increasing and our native fish in our stoked impoundments really spring into life and start gorging themselves on small baitfish, which means for us anglers a great time to be on the water particularly with the warmer afternoons.

Boondooma

The fish in our dams are reasonably deep for this time of year, particularly Australian Bass, but Yellow Belly can still be caught from the edge in the timbered arms of the dam. A few Bass have been up shallower in the morning in about 20 ft but as the day warms they seem to be moving out into the 30 to 60 ft range. The reason for the fish sitting so deep is the bait. The bass are feeding on very small shrimp, red claw and massive schools of bony bream. The large percentage of this forage for the fish is moving along the bottom out in those deeper zones of the dam.

If you want to target Yellow Belly the edges in the Boyne Arm and the Stuart are producing nice fish on lipless crankbaits cast up around the timber and the rocks.

For Bass, Blades and 20 gram spoons in 18 to 25 ft in the morning is the best. Later in the day look in 30 to 60 ft as the bass will be moving out off the edge to forage on the masses of bait getting around.

The afternoon has been the pick of the times to be on the water, as the fish are responding well to the warmer afternoons. Once that water has been getting above 17 degrees, the deeper sections along the Barbour's Pole area and the main lake points have been fishing very well. Fishing water this deep is still quite easy using 1/2 ounce blades, spoons, Tail spinners and 1/2 ounce rigged plastics fished along the bottom or mid column. Leisegangs ledge, Pelican point and the main lake points up the front of the dam near the wall have also been producing some good fish.

The locals have been really enjoying the fishing conditions at lake Boondooma of late.

Bait fisherman have been getting good catches of yellow belly in the Boyne arm of the dam fishing close to trees and the Boyne rocks. Most have been using shrimps and worms. It's a good idea to use smaller sinkers as the bite is hard to detect if you're using huge ball sinkers. Simply tie up to a tree drop your bait to the bottom and slowly move the bait up and down off the bottom. It won't be long until you get a bite.

Trollers have been getting a few Yellow belly but they have to work hard for them. Make sure you take a tackle retriever with you as you're bound to get a snag or two whilst trolling.

Redclaw are quiet but still coming in around the shallow rocky edges, soft fruits and vegetables have been the best bait during the winter months.

Lake Barambah

Typically, in spring, BP dam's fish move in closer to the edge and can be caught using a few methods. Lately, the best edge fishing methods have been Eco gear ZX blades, Skirted Jigs and Jerk baits cast up shallow. Slower moving baits like the ones suggested are dynamite and the key is small hops off the bottom near the edge with the ZX blades and long pauses near the edge with the jerkbaits.





Some cracking bass have been caught at BP Dam of late.

The deeper flats have also been producing lots of fish be it bass or yellow belly. Ecogear ZX Blades fished vertical have been the best method. Most anglers have been sounding fish in about 20ft and sitting on top of them, Eco gear ZX blades have been the real standout as they have two small stinger hooks attached. Drop them down to the bottom and hop them with small sharp hops, a fish only needs to touch them and the stinger hooks will grab them very quickly. Best spots have been the big flat out from the main dam wall.

The yellow belly are keen on worms or yabbies as the afternoon heats up.

It's Valuable to remember that most fish in the dam are gorging themselves on small bony bream so it's a great idea to throw anything that looks like a small bait fish, so soft plastics have been another method used to catch some quality fish. Look for steeper banks that hold some timber or rocks as this is a likely place that fish will be looking for bait up shallow. Out deeper try to find flats that are close to significant drop offs or the main submerged creek line.

Bait fisherman have been getting a ton of nice fish from BP dam. Most have been fishing along the edge and fishing worms, yabbies and shrimps.

Trollers are catching the odd fish trolling around the main lake points, small deep diving hard bodies are the best. Redclaw have gone very quiet and should start popping back up as the water gets warmer.



Until next time, tight line and bent rods.

New fishing regulations now effective

Future Queenslanders will continue to get access to fresh local seafood and thousands of jobs will be protected under changes to fisheries regulations that come into effect today.

Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries Mark Furner said the changes were part of the Palaszczuk Government's plan to protect fish for the future.

"Our state's fisheries belong to all Queenslanders and it is our job to protect fish for the future," Mr Furner said.

"Some of our fish stocks like scallops, snapper and pearl perch are at risk, with stock levels under the nationally recommended 20 per cent biomass level.

"If we do nothing now, we will have to take more drastic steps like they are proposing in South Australia with the closure of the snapper season for three years.

"Quite simply, if there are no fish, there is no fishing industry here in Queensland.

"Introducing catch limits for at risk species and continuing to crack down on illegal fishing will help us rebuild numbers."

Changes for commercial fishers include:

Establishing new total allowable commercial catch limits of 42 tonnes for snapper and 15 tonnes for pearl perch. There is currently no catch limit on these species.

Expanding vessel tracking for remaining commercial fishing boats from 1 January 2020

Small area closures to protect juvenile prawns in South East Queensland to improve profitability for trawl operators

Fisheries Queensland will soon send affected commercial fishing licence holders detailed information about the new commercial catch limits and reporting requirements.

Mr Furner said almost 1 million Queenslanders went recreational fishing in the state last year.

"To ensure recreational fishers can continue to catch fish, we need to have sensible limits to protect fish for the future," he said.

Changes for recreational fishers include:

Introducing new annual seasonal closures for snapper and pearl perch from 15 July – 15 August.

New boat limits, which hold the operator of the boat responsible for ensuring no more than two times the possession limit for nine priority black market species – mud crab, prawns, snapper, black jewfish, barramundi, Spanish mackerel, shark, tropical rock lobster, sea cucumber – is on board at any time. For example, the personal in-possession limit of mud crab will be 7 and the boat limit will be 14. The boat limit does not apply to charter boats.

General possession limit of 20 fish, excluding bait.

Reducing mud crab limit from 10 to 7.

Queensland Seafood Marketers Association President Marshall Betzel said the changes were just part of the overall strategic reforms that industry has been waiting for.

"The QSMA is hopeful these regulation changes will play an important part in providing not just a sustainable supply of seafood products to the consumer, but also create a long-term vision for growth in the Queensland seafood industry," Mr Betzel said.

"We hope these reforms will help provide long term jobs growth in the industry as well as provide a better degree of certainty of supply for future generations of seafood consumers."

Minister Furner said introducing the changes now meant we would continue to have Queensland fish on the table, protect thousands of jobs in both the commercial and recreational sectors and protect our marine ecosystem and the Great Barrier Reef.

"The Government has comprehensively consulted over the past two years on these reforms," Mr Furner said.

"There has been a lot of myths about these changes and what it means for fishing in Queensland.

"I encourage anyone who loves to fish to find out for themselves how the government is protecting fish stocks for our children and grandchildren by visiting our website, fisheries.qld.gov.au".

Australian bass possession limit in SIPS impoundments increased from 2 to 5

Mary River cod possession limit of 1 in stocked impoundments expanded to include Wyaralong Dam, Ewen Maddock Dam, Caboolture River Weir, Robina Lakes, Lake Kurwongbah, Enoggera Reservoir and Lake Manchester

Murray cod and Mary River cod size limit simplified to minimum 60cm with no maximum

Tinana Creek and its tributaries upstream of Teddington Weir wall closed to all forms of fishing to protect Mary river cod

Murray cod seasonal closure changed to 1 August to 31 October each year

New waters closed to line fishing (or possession of a fishing line) to protect Mary River cod during spawning from 1 August to 31 October in the following locations:

Coomera River and tributaries upstream from the junction of Guanaba Creek and Coomera River (includes Guanaba Ck)

Albert River and tributaries upstream from the junction of Canungra Creek and Albert River (includes Canungra Creek)

Running Creek and tributaries (top of the Logan River Catchment)

Christmas Creek and tributaries (top of the Logan River Catchment)

Stanley River and tributaries upstream of the Somerset Dam Full Supply Level (above Neurum Creek and Stanley River junction)

Mary River and tributaries upstream from the junction of Six Mile Creek and Mary River, including Six Mile Creek and excluding Baroon Pocket Dam, Borumba Dam and Lake MacDonald (from dam walls to full supply level for each)



A vacant “Table for the Fallen” laid out for one absent diner was set up in a corner of the hall as a poignant reminder of all the lives lost in war.

Murgon RSL Sub-Branch vice-president Daryl Porteous explained the significance of the items on the Table for the Fallen.

The Fallen Soldier’s table is reserved to honour comrades in arms. This symbolizes that they are with us, here in spirit. We should never forget the brave men and women who answered our nation’s call to serve. We are ever mindful that the sweetness of enduring peace has always been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice. We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures, there are others who have endured the agonies of pain deprivation and death.

The Table is Round - set for one and symbolizing our everlasting concern for our fallen comrades.

The Table Cloth is White – symbolizing the purity of their intentions to respond to their country’s call to arms.

The Single Rose – displayed in the vase reminds us of the families and friends of our missing brothers who keep faith while awaiting their return.

The Red Ribbon – tied prominently on the vase reminds us of the red ribbons worn on the lapels and brothers who are not among us tonight.

The Place Setting – single, alone no friends or family to dine with.

A Slice of Lemon – reminds us of the bitter fate of those who may never return.

A Pinch of Salt – symbolizes the tears endured by the families of those who have sacrificed all.

The Glass is Inverted – they cannot toast with us this night.

The Chair is Empty – they are not here.

The Candle – reminiscent of the light of hope which lives in our hearts to light the way home.

Sub-Branch president Trevor Williamson OAM detailed some of the history of the association, which was formed on September 1, 1919, by Murgon residents who had served in World War I.

The foundation stone for the Murgon War Memorial was laid on Anzac Day 1920 and was officially unveiled on November 30, 1921.

Initially, meetings were held in the upstairs room at the School of Arts, which stood near where the Commonwealth Bank is today.

The Sub-Branch then shifted into a room in the Town Hall building, where they met from 1939 to 1966 until the Murgon Services Club opened across the road.

Mr Williamson said the Sub-Branch currently had 62 service members.

“We have seen a resurgence in membership of the past 12-18 months,” he said.

He said the Sub-Branch recognised that it needed to modernise its operations to cater for the needs of younger veterans.

Planning for its new drop-in centre – to be built in Stephens Street West, between the Murgon Courthouse and the South Burnett Regional Council offices – was well under way.

A longer-term plan was also being developed to build low-cost housing for veterans on a block of former railway land behind the drop-in centre.

Member for Wide Bay Llew O’Brien, who committed a Coalition government to providing funding for the drop-in centre ahead of the Federal Election, said he had received a letter from Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack confirming the \$450,000 grant.

Mr O’Brien made the announcement before performing the official Toast to the RSL.

Local police officer Alan Gerrard, a director of the Murgon RSL Sub-Branch, then performed the Loyal Toast.

Comper for the evening was Andrew Plint.

Cherbourg Health Service is marked Women's Health Week by raising awareness of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorder (FASD).

FASD is the term used for a range of lifelong physical and neurodevelopment impairments that result from brain damage caused by alcohol exposure before birth.

"Consuming alcohol while pregnant can cause significant damage to the baby in the womb. This damage can have lifelong impacts on physical and cognitive abilities, learning and behaviour, as well as on general health and wellbeing," Senior Psychologist Cherbourg Health Service Mr Arvind Ponnappalli said.

"The safest option for women and their babies, is to not consume alcohol whilst pregnant or trying to fall pregnant. There is no known safe amount of alcohol or safe time to drink alcohol during pregnancy.

"Alcohol use during pregnancy is prevalent across different communities and countries. We are raising awareness in our community of FASD to try prevent this public health issue."

"This year we have made our FASD awareness campaign interactive with the hope it will leave a lasting impression. The Cherbourg team has also been actively delivering educational sessions to different groups in the community.

"So far we have presented to different football clubs, developed wallet cards with important local and state-wide services, and developed Power Point presentations to capture different audiences," Mr Ponnappalli said. "It is really important we make our community aware of the health risks associated with consuming alcohol while pregnant.

"We also want our community, particularly women, to feel that there is support out there for them."

airdrop cargo and paratroops in-flight; airlift a variety of cargo loads; and conduct aeromedical evacuation of sick or wounded personnel.

The first Spartan arrived in Australia in 2015 and the squadron is located at RAAF Base Amberley.

Initial Operational Capability (IOC) for the Spartan was declared in late 2016.

About the Aircraft

The C-27J Spartan battlefield airlifter will complement the Australian Defence Force's existing air mobility fleet. Its capabilities bridge the gap between Army helicopters, such as the CH-47F Chinook, and larger Air Force aircraft, such as the C-130J Hercules and C-17A Globemaster III.

The Spartan will provide airlift of people, equipment and supplies in Australia and our region. It can operate from unsurfaced airstrips, and support humanitarian missions in remote locations.

Specifications: Crew - Pilot, co-pilot, loadmaster, Capacity - 34 passengers; 21 stretcher patients; 5,000kg of cargo, Max Speed - 670 km/h. Weapons - Electronic self-protection measures, Wing span - 28.7 m.



Pride And Sadness At Hall Of Fame

August 3, 2019

It was a proud – but sad – day for Cherbourg residents when Jeffrey "Mitta" Dynevor was inducted into the Queensland Boxing Hall of Fame.

The ceremony, organised by the Boxing Supporters Association of Queensland, was held during a special lunch at the Showmen's Club at Yatala.

A busload from Cherbourg – including many of Mitta's relatives, four young Cherbourg boxers and Mayor Arnold Murray – attended the event on July 21.

Mitta's nephew and namesake Jeffrey Dynevor told southburnett.com.au it had been a very good day.

"Everyone was happy and sad, too, at the same time," he said.

"Sad because Uncle Mitta wasn't there to be a part of it, and happy and proud that he was being acknowledged."

Mitta (1938-2008) was the first Aboriginal boxer to win a Commonwealth Games gold medal.

In 1962, along with fellow Cherbourg boxers Adrian Blair and Eddie Barney, he competed at the then-British Empire and Commonwealth Games in Perth.

Mitta came home with a gold medal after defeating Ghana's Samuel Abbey in the final.

The Queensland Boxing Hall of Fame was opened in 2006, and since then boxers and boxing associates have been inducted every year.

Other South Burnett boxers already honoured include Noel "Stumpy" Butwell (inducted 2008), Arthur Cripps (2011) and Arthur "Bullet" Bradley (2015).

Boxing historian Bob Webster said he had been "blown away" by the day.

"There were 230 people in a hall that should really only take about 200!" he said.

"The presentation was very emotive," he said.

"Young Jeff teared up and he wasn't the only one. The expression on everyone's faces of sheer pride and delight was amazing."

Bob said it was also special because the young Cherbourg boxers – who came down in their club uniforms – had

the opportunity to meet and pose for photos with the many former champions who were in the room.

“It was one helluva positive event,” he said. “It was just an amazing day.”

The actual induction ceremony was carried out by Boxing Supporters Association of Queensland president Scott Tweedie after a short talk by “Bullet” Bradley, who shared memories of his gym mate, Mitta.

Mitta’s nephew Jeffrey, niece Rosemary and grandson William were invited on stage to accept the award.

“Uncle was a very respectful gentleman, inside and outside the ring,” Jeffrey said.

“He did not talk much about his boxing career with his family but he would always yarn with other boxers, and he was very happy to share his knowledge and stories.”

Jeffrey said he had mixed emotions.

“When I got the phone call from Bob Webster, I was so excited that I could not wait to tell people of this breakthrough for our deadly uncle hero,” he said.

“We have great sadness in our hearts and minds because Uncle Mitta is not here to witness his induction.

“However, we are very grateful, happy and full of pride that Uncle Mitta has been recognised for his boxing career.

“And we know that Uncle Mitta would be feeling the same.”

Mitta’s eldest grandchild, William Docherty, also spoke.

He said his Pop was born in 1938 in Thargomindah.

Mitta and his siblings were moved to Cherbourg in 1946.

“Pop was one of the outstanding athletes who came out of Cherbourg,” William said.

He thanked the Queensland Boxing Association for inducting his grandfather.

“Pop is an inspiration to all of us.”

As well as Mitta, two other boxers and two boxing associates were inducted into the Hall of Fame during the lunch:

Gold Coast boxer Gavin Topp, who won the Australian Super Welterweight Title in 2000,

Brisbane boxer Ronald Doo, who won the Australian Super Welterweight Title in 1990,

Boxing associates, the Unwin family (the first time a family has been inducted), and Former boxer and Australian Olympic and Commonwealth Games team manager Paul Thompson.

Finally the time arrived for the presentation of prizes. Those students who received first place, their entries will now go onto the next level of judging in Proston later in August.

Next year the country of study will be Japan. Cloyna students were able to show the ladies our extensive knowledge of Japanese. With our P-2 students impressing the group with their ability to speak Japanese and answer questions in Japanese.

The students of Cloyna SS and the ladies of CWA Hivesville are already anticipating the fun and adventures in 2020.

Scots in the Bush

The annual Scots in the Bush at Boondooma Homestead was another great event for our region. I had fun with Mayor Keith pretending to play the bagpipes with someone else doing it behind the curtain. We also lifted Gervie Fulleton's kilt up 10 inches as part of the fun of the ten years of the festival. No one knows what is actually worn under the kilt, but Gervie assured everyone that nothing is worn, because everything is in perfect working order!! Congratulations to the Boondooma Homestead Committee on another successful Scots in the Bush.

\$20,000 for the Murgon Town Hall

Thanks to Llew O'Brien for presenting a cheque to our Council for \$20,000 for the Murgon Town Hall. This is to put in a portable projector, screen and PA system. The hall is heritage listed so the equipment cannot be fixed permanently because of the heritage guidelines. However, the new equipment can be kept in the hall for use by the schools, the community and individuals as needed. I know this is a project that the schools in particular have wanted for a long time so thanks to Llew O'Brien for helping to make it happen.

Town Entry Signage

The villages across our region have not had entry signs for a long time so we are erecting new signs for all of the villages and towns. The style of the sign will be the same across the region however, the Councillors have had input into the artwork on the top of the sign for each area in their Division. Hivesville has an aboriginal connection to yams so the idea I have put forward is a picture of markets with a basket of yams. For Proston I put forward a campdraft profile and a bottle tree that I think is symbolic of the area. For Murgon I put forward dairy cows, the Lily Ponds because Murgon is aboriginal for Lily Ponds and a bass fish to represent the Bjelke Petersen Dam and for Moffatdale wine and grapes. These images are out for everyone to have a look at. The bottom of every sign across the region will have the indigenous python representing our connection to Wakka Wakka country. I hope that everyone likes the designs and would welcome feedback if anyone has major concerns.

Crime Rate in Murgon is Way Down

We have had positive feedback that the crime in Murgon has reduced significantly due to a number of different strategies. The BYTE Nites (Barambah Youth Together Evenings) have been given credit for contributing towards some of the success. We have been getting up to 83 young people attending. The nights have been very kindly sponsored by generous locals, community groups and businesses. The preparation of the meals and the bulk of the assistance on these nights is managed by volunteers. The Police and in particular our PCYC Branch Manager, Rene, have been simply awesome helping out every week to improve the safety of our community. These nights are not just about taking the youth off the streets they are about



building relationships, an understanding of their backgrounds and a mutual respect. New volunteers are always welcome so please contact the PCYC if you are interested on 41681889.

BYTE Nite Successful Projects

We planted out the large pots in Macalister Street and the participants painted their name on the flowerbed stakes. The plants have thrived and now have beautiful flowers. Another project was painting four large boards for the approaches to the walking bridge near the hospital. We held an event with the school and two of the young artists helped to erect the boards on the bridge. We had a sausage sizzle, speeches and a blessing of the bridge to build a sense of community pride and respect for the property.

Leven Little Lonsdales

I had the honour of introducing Merle Johnson for the launch of the book "Leven Little Lonsdales". The Lonsdale family were well known in the Proston/ Hivesville area where they lived on a Dairy Farm at Abbeywood from the 1950's until 1983. Some of the Lonsdale boys helped to build a worker's cottage at "Di Di" that we still use today. Merle has kindly donated a book to the Proston Library.
